Why this conference, and why now?

Climate change and the government's energy policy have moved to the centre of public policy debate. Current concerns across industry over high energy prices are part of the wider energy challenge facing the UK. These challenges include ageing power stations, security of supplies, the transition to being a gas importer, and climate change.

In the UK, key developments include the government's climate change programme review, its comprehensive review of energy policy and energy economics, and a possible Energy White Paper in 2006. Meanwhile the government is seeking new ways to develop a shared, global understanding of how the world can respond to climate change and engage with economies with

growing energy needs, such as India and China. The Montreal conference started a formal process to discuss a framework for international action – Kyoto Stage 2 – by 2012.

We want to play an active role in shaping UK energy policy and assessing the economic, social and environmental implications. The debate, we believe, needs to be taken forward on practical grounds, drawing on our shared knowledge and experience.
